Flood Part 2 Interim Evaluation Report

May 2017

There are a number of really useful lessons learnt during April 2017 that will change how we revisit Part 2 in autumn. Some of it practical about light levels and the size of follow spots. Some of it mundane about how we use our back stage spaces to ensure we can store those larger follow spots. Some of it to do with audience and developing furthe viewing platforms so that the last 50 or so members of the audience get the same quality of view as the first. And some of it about how we talk about the project in public and with the press; moving from an emphasis on spectacle and community engagement to bring more attention to the endeavour as an act of political discussion.

All those lessons seen with the benefit of 20/20 hindsight but welcome realisations nonetheless.

feedback we have had from various areas; the public, participants, residents and critics.

Public response was overwhelmingly positive, one of our best received shows.

The journey we went on with the residents is particularly satisfying; moving from open animosity to relatively warm acceptance in the space of 6 weeks a result of serious, determined, daily engagement and cheerfulness. It was not always easy, and a hard task to justify in the face of a gruelling rehearsal schedule but one that was, in the final reckoning, worth it.

The general treatment of the project by the press was strong; substantial support from the local Hull Daily Mail and wide reaching television pieces on both national and local news programmes. Critical coverage was sparser- a reflection of both a strategic press decision taken and a sign of the times. This is certainly an area of development for Part 4.

It has always been important that Slung Low achieve what they can in the right way, working in and around people's homes and families in the right manner. Producing pieces of political theatre with spectacle at their heart in public spaces but in a manner that can also be exciting to the local primary school kids. This is our aim. This document demonstrates that we got close enough to our aim to be proud of our efforts.

Residents' Performance 10th April 2017

The long-term engagement with Victoria Dock Residents was a key priority in this project. The early stages were not successful with the police being called within 20 minutes of our arrival on site on Day One despite various community meetings and correspondents in preparation.

We learnt quickly to communicate with precision and to keep up a regular flow of information to the residents about our activity. Working in the rain with a smile along with decision to listen to all complaints (no matter how disconnected they were with our project) won round the vast majority of our neighbours.

Along with workshops for young residents a private dress rehearsal for residents was performed. This proved to be very popular with all 400 tickets going in a few days.

In a relatively short amount of time the residents have become our neighbours. They ring when they think the set is sinking, text when they see people loitering around our store. We are moving towards being accepted as their 2017 theatre company in residence.

Young People Engagement

One of the engagement challenges was how to properly recognise the interest shown by the hundreds of local primary school children who passed the site twice a day given the adult themes of the show. Following suggestions from Hull City of Culture 2017 board member Sameerea Anwar-West we gave an assembly to the full school at Victoria Dock Primary School. The full company teaching 140 children the theme song of the show was a real highlight of our time in rehearsals.

There are few things more joyous than being greeted by dozens of children on their way to school as you work away on the water. Out of this chorus came one individual, Jim. With his parents Jim became a reliably punctual twice daily visitor and took on the important role of honorary Executive Producer; complete with his own personal high visibility jacket. His excitement at our activity caught the attention of local media and Jim appeared on local radio, television and national breakfast news.

We also held a free workshop for Victoria Dock residents aged below 12 who would not be able to see the show because of age restrictions and a session at Victoria House respite centre at their invitation.

Jim became so important to the team's morale in those difficult early weeks of fit-up that he soon took on a honorary role of Executive Producer and was presented with his own personal Flood high-visibility jacket.

With his mother Ruth, Jim would go on to a number of television and radio interviews, with photos of his appearance being watched as far afield as Malaysia appearing on social media.

On the event of his 5th birthday Jim, with his parents, wrote and presented the company with a poetic response to our time making Part 2.
