Update on partners and possible new partners

Hull 2017

Luke Bainbridge regularly liaising with Martin Atkinson and Sam Hunt. Contract signed and counter signed in December 2017. David Norris has invoiced for first two instalments of funding, as per contract. Funding should be released ASAP, which is quite key as Substance have been making payments upfront so far.

The Quietus

In December 2016 and January 2017, Luke Bainbridge agreed a deal with **The Quietus** to become a media partner of Substance. As part of the deal Substance will co-commission regular articles from new writers from across the North, writing on subjects relevant to Substance. The Quietus will also support/publicise Substance events throughout 2017.

The Guardian

Manchester International Festival

David Norris met with MIF to discuss potential joint event in Manchester in summer 2017 to mark 10th anniversary since the passing of Tony Wilson. MIF are interested in theory. David, Luke and Jon Drape to meet with Christine Cort, MIF Director on 26 Jan to discuss further.

BFI

We have £19,000 additional funding from BFI, for 'building audiences for independent film'. Martin Atkinson met with Anna Plant to discuss on 11 January. Luke B and Martin A to look at best use of funding for Leeds event and possible Ken Loach event in Hull. Also look at working with Into Film and BFI Film Academy in schools in Hull. Luke B, Anna and Martin to lead.

Sunderland 2021

Luke Bainbridge in discussion with Rebecca Ball, head of Sunderland's bid for UK City of Culture 2021, to partner on an event in Sunderland.





Northern Fiction Alliance

Luke Bainbridge met with the Northern Fiction Alliance and Comma Press in December 2016, to discuss collaborating on an event, and a possible book of short stories from Hull, or new voices from the North. NFA and Comma very keen to collaborate on this. Luke B to lead on this, and look to confirm in the next few weeks.

Northern Fiction Alliance (NFA) is a cohort assembled to showcase the output of northern indie presses to the international market in an attempt to "level the playing field" and promote regional diversity in publishing. The core NFA cohort includes Peepal Tree Press (Leeds), And Other Stories (relocating to Sheffield from High Wycombe), Dead Ink Books (Liverpool) and Comma Press (Manchester). The cohort will showcase and sell the work of "exciting and diverse" authors to help build the cultural identity of independent British fiction as well as British publishing based in the North.

RIBA

Sam Hunt suggests partnering with RIBA on the event they want to do with Patrick Scumacher in Hull, debating social housing. Would come under Substance umbrella.





Substance event plan for 2017

Throughout 2017, Substance will celebrate the cultural diversity of the North by bringing groundbreaking artists to new audiences with a series of innovative and provocative events across the North.

Following on from the inaugural Substance event, that took place in Hull in November 2016, the initial Substance roadmap for 2017 is below...



Structure of each event:

- The main event/performance will take place in the evening with engagement around this during the day.
- Before the evening event, the artist/s spend the day at a local college/organisation/club giving talks/passing on experience.
- Looking at the internationalism of the North and the history of arts and popular culture and the strong role second cities have played - i.e. it can be a more creative environment away from the capital.
- Spreading the message that you can have a career in the creative industries, with examples from artists of how they managed it.





February 2017: SUBSTANCE in Sunderland
